<ul> <li>Discuss the importance of water in our everyday lives and why we need to keep water areas, such as ponds and rivers clean.</li> <li>Share a range of water themed fiction/non-fiction books</li> <li>Retell familiar stories in own words.</li> <li>Build a collection of words about water, e.g. rain, puddles, splash, wet, drops etc</li> <li>Describe characters, sea creatures.</li> <li>Creating an "under The Sea" water -themed role play area.</li> <li>Discuss some exciting facts about sea creatures</li> <li>Describe and talk about the features of animals/ pirates/mermaids/m ermen</li> <li>Encourage children to act like a sea creatures.</li> <li>Creating and talk about the features of animals/</li> <li>Discuss some ermen</li> <li>Create bridges, aquariums, submarines and lighthouses using a range of modelling materials.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>yoga.</li> <li>Share water experiences visits to beaches, aquariums etc</li> <li>Talk about 'Recycling' and plastic damage</li> <li>Lead the children to go on under the sea adventures and invite them to develop storylines in their play</li> <li>Reflections in water whose water is still</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Write messages in a bottle or secret 'merperson' messages for a friend.</li> <li>Write about how to conserve water.</li> <li>Hide and seek tricky words (animal themed)</li> <li>Label the parts of the body of sea creatures</li> <li>Paint over the crayon with the paint to reveal the message.</li> <li>Feed the Shark phonics game</li> <li>Invite children to develop storylines in their play by decorating large cardboard boxes as submarines. Invite children to go on under the sea adventures together.</li> <li>Write their own "Under the Sea" stories</li> <li>Label a pirate treasure map</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Sort and categorise sea creatures based on size, colour, patterns etc.</li> <li>Practise counting skills by counting tentacles, pins points of a starfish</li> <li>Order numbers 0-20 water- themed resources.</li> <li>Explore patterns waves, footprints in sand, seashells</li> <li>Provide a range of shells and compare their sizes, colours and shapes.</li> <li>Treasure chests and coins with numerals</li> <li>Explore number bonds of 10 using pictures of sea creatures.</li> <li>Explore size and capacity, filling and emptying various containers full/half full/empty, big/small.</li> <li>Make predictions. 'Which container holds the most?'</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Explore waterproof materials.</li> <li>Explore floating and sinking 'Which items will float and which will not?'</li> <li>Learn about rock pools, fossils, sand and beaches</li> <li>Discuss how to stay safe near water</li> <li>Discuss how we care for fish as pets.</li> <li>Watch David Attenbrough- Blue Planet</li> <li>Find the oceans and continents on a globe/map</li> <li>Encourage the children to find the big bodies of water using a globe/map.</li> <li>Encourage children to explore 'How to make the water flow faster?', 'How can you change the direction of the water flow?',</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Design appropriate dress/outfits for different weather conditions</li> <li>Finger painting an underwater scene</li> <li>Junk modelling - succeatures, pirate shetc</li> <li>Bubble painting</li> <li>Work collaborative to create a large scale fish, dolphins sharks etc.</li> <li>Share a range of paint, crayons, pastels and other creative materials to make their own underwater scenes</li> <li>Make posters for a local wildlife area of supporting conservation of loc ponds.</li> <li>Design boats using range of objects - what are the different water challenges? Can they move the boa without using their hands?</li> </ul>



Home Ideas:
<ul> <li>Share stories – retell and act them out e.g. The Crocodile Who Doesn't Like water, The Flying Bath, The River: An Epic Journey To the Sea</li> <li>Talk about their recent holiday activities</li> <li>Give your children responsibility to help with household chores – spray the window cleaner and clean the windows is a favourite!</li> <li>Share a family meal and talk about your day.</li> <li>Share story books e.g. Tiddler and talk about what is happening on each page</li> <li>Plant seeds such as cress – and watching them grow making sure they have enough water</li> <li>Freeze small toys in ice – and work out how to get them out of the ice</li> <li>Make a treasure map for pirates</li> <li>Talk about their experiences of water including swimming pools, ponds, rivers and the sea</li> </ul>
